one has a piece torn away. Budge's English translations of the Book of the Dead papyri, taken from several different papyri discovered across the Near East, including several manuscripts excavated at Thebes. Most of these were first translated into English and then published in Great Britain during the late 1890s in various editions. This set is the first American trade edition, with the translation revised and corrected from the earlier British publication. Oxford DNB, M. Smith, "Budge, Sir Ernest Alfred Thompson Wallis". Scalf 364. Sir Budge was an avid Egyptologist and made numerous expeditions to Iraq, Egypt, and the Sudan. He was a high-level administrator and curator for the British Museum. Many of his artifacts were unethically obtained, and he leaves behind a controversial legacy. Though Budge published numerous monographs on Cuneiform, Syriac, and Ancient Egyptian, his Book of the Dead is one of the few texts still useful to modern researchers. A fascinating work of classical scholarship, one that made ancient Egyptian religious traditions accessible to English scholars and readers. \$750






Carson grew up near Arapaho and Cheyenne Native American Tribes, and was intimately acquainted with several members of these Nations. Vestal was a significant scholar of Western American history and literature, and his biography of Carson presents a factual, exciting account of the mountain man and traveler's days. \$400

A contemporary bookplate on the front pastedown, with mild sunning to the spine and a minute push to the top textblock. ANB, Matthew W. Stolper "Olmstead, Albert Ten Eyck". Albert Olmstead was a scholar of the ancient Near East, teaching at Princeton, the University of Illinois, and at the University of Chicago. He served as curator of the Oriental Museum at the U of I, and wrote several ground-breaking treatises on historical method, textual criticism, and source criticism. Olmstead was concerned with the study of the politics and history of the events in the ancient Near East, and urged his colleagues to study the region outside of its language and philology. Although modern historical methods have since been applied to studying Assyria, Babylon, the Hittites, and other civilizations, Olmstead can be remembered for creating new standards in his discipline. This is his first published book, and it remains one of the largest in scope and accesibility when it comes to a book that presents the history of an ancient people. **\$375** 





A prominent work in the field of applied ethics providing the philosophical underpinnings of the modern animal rights movement. This book popularized the term "speciesism", the concept that one species is superior to another. Singer's treatise focuses on the suffering animals experience in factory farm settings and in scientific research labs. His book advocates vegetarianism as a moral imperative, and provides advice on a healthy vegetarian diet. An attractive copy of this important book, uncommon in the first edition. \$400








Blackmer 1142. Hogg 3508. Howgego B10. Ibrahim-Hilmy 49. In his first expedition to Egypt and the Sudan, Baker learned Arabic, and took notes on the geology of the Nile and its tributaries. The second expedition, which is recorded here, was one Baker undertook to annex the Sudan for Egypt and to abolish the slave trade there. He took his second wife with him, and she provided military and domestic help to the expedition party. The Bakers

fought several intense battles against the slave traders, and engaged in big game hunting. Several of the illustrations depict these experiences. The second expedition began in 1869, the year in which the Khedive Isma'il appointed Baker to a four-year term as governor-general of the equatorial Nile basin. To that date it was the most senior post a European had received under the Egyptian government. The Khedive provided Baker with a small navy to annex the area, suppress the slave trade, establish cotton production, and to open the regional lakes up to trade networks. Baker's attempt to annex the Sudan was met with fierce resistance, particularly by the slave traders. However, it is worth noting that after defeat, many of the men working for the slave traders joined Baker in his colonization efforts. Baker and his party's work helped to suppress the slave trade in some areas, but others remained impossible to influence. Egyptian influence was extended southwards, but not to the entire region. Unhappily for Egypt, Baker could not annex two of the wealthy kingdoms in the area either. Baker remains famous for being the first to explore the source of the Nile, and for writing Ismailia, one of the most important Victorian narratives of African travel. \$1,250





The Affluent Society is Galbraith's best-known book. It builds on one of his early publications, titled American Capitalism. In The Affluent Society, Galbraith describes what was then the American economy: an economy which prioritized the production of consumer and military products by the private sector. Galbraith also discusses the advertising industry, a tool which he saw as increasing consumer wants for such products. He also elaborates on the credit system, which helped corporations increase and manage the volume of their sales. Ultimately, this economy increased consumerism, but reduced the ability of the household to save extra income. The author laments the U.S. Government of the post-war era, as he saw them preoccupied with military expenditures rather than investment in schools, arts, and public services. Galbraith's books are accessible to educated readers, not just economists. His poignant insight into the American economy made him one of the most important intellectual figures of the twentieth century. He was an economic advisor to every Democratic President from Franklin Roosevelt to Bill Clinton. A Keynesian, Galbraith argued against tax cuts, and believed that a government should invest in its citizens' infrastructure, health, art, and even in research and development for new and helpful technologies. His opponents often referred to his views as radical, but he is largely remembered as a progressive economist who acutely understood the institution that is the American private sector. \$300





In this publication, Rink discusses the cultural practices of a few different Inuit peoples, including their languages, laws, social hierarchies, religious traditions, livelihoods, arts, music, and medical knowledge. Rink's book includes 150 tales and legends from this region's peoples. Difficult to find in nice condition, this is an exceptional copy. **\$450**



A posthumous publication by the Commander of the Hindenburg. Lehmann served as commander of the Graf Zeppelin and as a commander of the Hindenburg. Lehmann died from his injuries he sustained during the Hindenburg explosion. This volume details the story of how the airship was developed in Germany by Zeppelin and Dr. Hugo Eckener, and how the airship was used in World War I by the German army. Charles Rosendahl contributed a chapter on the Hindenburg disaster and an analysis of the investigative findings up to that point in 1937. A fascinating first-hand account of the Zepplin as a war machine and as a means of transportation, written by one of the most famous airshipmen of all time. \$350




to the civilized world of the Byrd Antarctic Expedition. The first prize was \$250.00 in cash and a personalized, inscribed copy of Byrd's Little America. ANB, Vincent P. Norris, "Byrd, Richard Evelyn". Richard Byrd was a geologist and explorer of the Arctic regions. After securing funding in the late twenties he journeyed to Antarctica, arriving at the Bay of Whales in December of 1928. He brought ships, aircrafts, ninety-four dogs, and two years' worth of supplies. Forty-two men set out with Byrd. They built the camp, Little America, on the Ross Ice Shelf, where the party stayed during the winter while conducting expeditions to examine the mineral deposits of the region, and to map 150,000 miles of what was then new territory. At the end of 1929, accompanied by three other men, Byrd flew to the South Pole. For this he was awarded the Navy Cross and promoted to Rear Admiral. A few years later, Byrd would return to the Antarctic for another, longer expedition. It is difficult to find signed copies of the trade edition in jacket, which makes this an exceptional copy of arctic history. \$650









and an anthropologist. From 1880 to 1884 Lumholtz sailed to Australia from Norway (his native country) and proceeded to travel around the country, collecting samples of then-unrecorded species and recording ethnographies of Aboriginal peoples. He spent many months in Queensland collecting zoological specimens of Kangaroo, other marsupials, and of plants native to Australia. He traveled with an Aboriginal tribe in the rural region for fourteen months, so to better track the animals he sought to research. This volume also records his impressions of the tribe with which he spent time. His commentary is often unkind, reflecting a Eurocentrist view of humanity. Lumholtz' book was notably one of the first extensive accounts of the customs, religion, and traditions of an Aboriginal people. Several of the illustrations depict the Aboriginal people at rest, working, or engaged in a Borboby. A nice copy of Lumholtz' travel narrative to sun-baked Australia. \$350





Jung delineated people based on whether they were extroverted or introverted. He also classified people based on the predominate functions of their mind (thinking, feeling, sensation, and intuition). 





