





Price of \$3.50 on the front panel of the dust jacket. Illustrated with a color frontispiece and eleven watercolor plates and numerous additional duotone plates. With a folding map. The illustrations depict the Grand Canyon, the University of Arizona at Tucson, the Hopi Snake Dance, Hopi, Pueblo, and Havasupai individuals, an Apache raiding party at Tumacacori, and Navajo people weaving blankets. A Near Fine book with a touch of foxing to the leaves in a Very Good jacket with a few small tape repairs to the reverse and some minor foxing and edge wear. Arizona Historical Society, "John A. Rockfellow Photograph Collection". With a signed letter to John Rockfellow, addressed to him at the Stronghold in Cochise, Ariz. The letter is postmarked February of 1917, several months before October of 1917, when the book was published. In it


Wharton James states that he is sorry to have missed Rockfellow, but that on his return from Prescott and El Paso, he would like to discuss the history of the Stronghold in Cochise with Rockfellow. For fifteen years the Stronghold in Cochise was home to the Chiricahua Apache leader Cochise and his people (around 1,000 or so individuals). It is now part of the Coronado National Forest. Cochise was buried here after he died peacefully, though his exact burial site remains unlocated to this day. John Rockfellow was a silver miner, an entrepeneur, a mathematics instructor, and a rancher. In 1883, Rockfellow bought land in the Cochise Stronghold to become a rancher. Rockfellow owned his ranch in the Dragoon Mountains during the height of the conflict between the U.S. Army and the Apache. His ranch was subject to frequent raids by Apache groups, thus he would have been an interesting source of information for Wharton James on the history of the Apaches in Arizona. James presumably caught up with Rockfellow, as the rancher and the tours he gave of the Stronghold are mentioned on page 425 of Wharton James' book. A very attractive example of this fascinating and meticulous history of Arizona and its peoples. \$750












A collection of humorous folk tales from the Black American community, most with their origins traced back to the fifty years after the issuing of the Emancipation Proclamation. John Mason Brewer was a scholar and folk-





lorist who was born in Texas in 1896. His life work was collecting Black Texan stories, and preserving the history and tradition of the Black Texan community. He graduated from Wiley College in 1917, and would go on to work with J. Frank Dobie to publish several of the folk tales he heard around barbershops, in general stores, and in churches. The stories Brewer published, including the ones in this volume, are focused on Black preachers, and Christianity in the Black Texan community. There are also stories that reflect the experience of enslaved Black Texans, and how their lives evolved after the end of the Civil War. Brewer was the first Black member of the Texas Folklore Society and of the Texas Institute of Letters. He remains a vital Western-American historian and scholar. \$175





Scarce in commerce, the second edition of Snowden's History of the Americas provides background on Columbus and the early European explorers, and gives a history of the Western Hemisphere up through the American Revolution. \$300

Rear-Admiral Ammen was childhood friends with Ulysses S. Grant, and at one point saved the future general from drowning as a boy. Here he details his naval career, and how the U.S. navy evolved during the nineteenth century. Ammen himself took part in several naval battles of the U.S. Civil War on the S.S. Roanoke, the S.S. Seneca, the S.S. Mohican (and on other ships), and had to put down a mutiny on the S.S. Ocean Queen. After the war, he contributed to innovations in deep sea navigation and sailing. Ammen led a fascinating life filled with courage and adventure. This is a nice copy of his professional memoirs. \$250








intimate biography of Lincoln's life. Wall etched different courthouses, cabins, and landscapes around the United States as he retraced Lincoln's steps from his birth to the Presidency. Born in New York, Bernhardt Wall was a famous printer and lithographer who came up under Dard Hunter's tutelage. He created etchings of famous American presidents, people, and landmarks including Sam Huston, Mark Twain, several cities of the American West, and of course Abraham Lincoln. He etched three sitting presidents of the United States, and remains an important figure in fine and private press history. \$150



Inscribed by the author on the free front endpaper to Stella Jones. Stella Jones was herself a young suffragette at the time, and would go to New York state to campaign




for NAWSA around ten years after Livermore's death. The inscription is labeled as being in "Melrose Mass", where Livermore died. Livermore also included a quote for Stella: "Do thy duty - that is best; Leave unto they Lord the rest". Near Fine. Bookplate of Stella Jones on the front pastedown and a touch of rubbing to the tips. ANB, Marilyn Elizabeth Perry, "Livermore, Mary, (19 December 1820-23 May 1905)". Krichmar 4843. Melrose Public Library, Melrose, Mass, "Stella Worth Jones with two women at the shore". Mary Livermore was an early suffragist, a resolute abolitionist, and a Civil War nurse. She worked as a teacher, a journalist, and a lecturer during the latter part of the nineteenth century, publishing a few books during her lifetime. She raised money on behalf of the medical needs of the Union Army, and worked hard to organize several charity initiatives for impoverished women and girls during her residence in the Chicago area. She also served as a newspaper editor and founder. Livermore was a strong, opinionated woman, who worked hard to champion moral causes near and dear to her until her death. A fascinating association copy and an example of the intersection of two generations of the fight for women's rights. \$500



Wright himself led a troubled life, going bankrupt through multiple investment failures. However, the author is remembered as a significant urban booster of the city and a predictor of several societal changes that Chicago witnessed during the nineteenth century. \$275



Text reads: You Can't Jail the Revolution, Stop the Trial, Free the Conspiracy 8, 28 E. Jackson Chicago 427-7773. Printed on cream paper with text and imagery in red. The address printed on the poster is now in an area popular for student housing, close to the lake in the Loop and near DePaul, Columbia College, and Roosevelt University. Likely, this address and phone number were those of the residence of one of the student activists who organized the protests of the trial. Very near Fine. Britannica "The Chicago 7 Law Case". The Chicago 8 was a group of young counter-culture figures that included Abbie Hoffman and Jerry Rubin, founders of the Youth International Party (YIPPIES), Tom Hayden, a co-founder in Students for a Democratic Society, Black Panther Chairman Bobby Seale, David Dellinger and Rennie Davis, members of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (MOBE), and John Froines and Lee Weiner (accused of making stink bombs). These men were tried on charges of criminal conspiracy and intent to incite a riot while crossing state lines. The trial would last from late September of 1969 until February 18th, 1970. Eventually, seven of the eight had their convictions overturned, largely due to impropriety on the behalf of the FBI and Judge Hoffman's displayed biases against the defendants. However, Bobby Seale would spend four years in prison, found in contempt of the court. The Chicago 8 are known by several names, such as: "The Conspiracy 8", "The Chicago 8", and "The Chicago 7". The story of the Chicago 8 sheds light on twentieth-century police brutality, the counter-culture movement during the 1960s, and racism within America's judicial system. This poster is a bright, fascinating piece of ephemera from the turbulent trial that took place shortly after the also-turbulent Democratic National Convention of 1968. **\$250** 












The engravings depict the Northern Lights, glaciers, Sitka, Alaska, volcanoes of the region, the culture, the tools, and portraits of the Chukchis and Koyukon peoples, life in the Yukon, moose hunting, and Fort Yukon. Published the year after the first British edition was released. A Very Good book with the corners, spine ends, and the front joints neatly touched up; three or so full-page illustrations lack their tissue guards, and the map shows a tear. Arctic Bibliography 19424. Dictionary of Canadian Biography, "Frederick Whymper". Wickersham 6030. In 1865 Whymper joined the Russian-American Telegraph Project, an initiative to link Europe and the U.S. via telegraph that would run through Siberia. This book is his record of traveling around Chukotka and Petropavlovsk, then into Kamchatka and around the Okhotsk Sea, and up and down the Yukon River. A fascinating account of what was then a new U.S. territory, with vivid descriptions of the native peoples, the Russians in the territory, and the issue of scurvy. \$225










Strong's history of Wisconsin begins with the earliest European exploration of the Eastern Seaboard, and then transitions to early exploration of what is now Wisconsin and Minnesota. Strong also includes a history of the Langlade family, some of the earliest European residents of Wisconsin (during its days as a U.S. Territory), an exposition on Green Bay, Chequamegon, Prairie du Chien, Milwaukee, and other Wisconsin cities, notes on the Black Hawk War, early mining, and details on the transition of the Wisconsin area from a territory to a statehood. \$200


a physician in the early nineteenth century, and attended to patients in Virginia. He died in Powhatan County in 1836. He was beloved by his patients, and was remembered as a generous practicioner of medicine. Benjamin Rush was a pre-eminent physician in his day and wrote about Yellow Fever, mental illness, and the health of soldiers. This volume contains the classic description of Yellow Fever in the United States, with gruesome depctions of the patients' symptoms. The book also contains a chapter on curing a patient's suffering and a chapter on preventing another widespread outbreak of Yellow Fever in the United States. \$600



Landmarks all across the North Eastern Seaboard are sketched, as far south as Virginia, and as far north as Niagara Falls. A beautiful set of skilled lithography, capturing some of the most beautiful spots in the United States as they were in the middle of the nineteenth century. \$1,500








Watters served as an intermediary between British and American Methodists (particularly John Wesley and Francis Asbury) during the Revolutionary War and was one of the few to take an oath of allegiance to the then-new United States. His actions helped build support for Francis Asbury during the establishment of the American Methodist Church. An early American autobiography, and a record of travel around colonial Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. \$125


