The first separate edition of Minkowski's classic paper in which he first described what is now referred to as Minkowski spacetime, a mathematical structure consisting of the set of all real 4-tuples and an ordering relation that determines the past and future light cones of each point in the structure. The paper was first published in Jahresbericht der Deutschen Mathematiker-Vereinigung (Annual Report of the German Mathematical Society) in 1909, but was printed and distibuted separately later that year as an offprint following Minkowski's death in January. 






Muir was a key founder of environmentalism and the movement for ecological preservation in the United

States. It was through his persistent lobbying and campaigning that several national forests were established, and it is thanks to him that Sequoia National Park was founded, with the help and support of Theodore Roosevelt. Muir was a friend of Roosevelt's, as the two went camping together. Throughout his life Muir explored American natural wilderness, including the Yosemite valley, its glaciers, forests, and mountains, as well as the lands of Alaska. Muir plays a crucial role in the history of our National Parks, and founded the Sierra Club, a non-profit dedicated to protecting American wilderness for all generations to enjoy. A beautiful example of Muir's second book, according to Kimes, "considered by many Muir admirers to be his finest book". \$1,500



Austin is one of the best-known philosophers in the ordinary language school and was extremely influential in the development of modern pragmatics. This book is a careful reconstruction of Austin's lectures on sense-preception based on several sets of notes prepared by Austin himself. \$200

Oxford DNB, Alec Cairncross, "Keynes, John Maynard, Baron Keynes (1883–1946)". Keynes' Economic Consequences of the Peace threw the author into the international spotlight, drawing readership in the U.K., the U.S., and France. During the First World War, Keynes was a member of the Supreme Economic Council of the Allied and Associated Powers, and was in charge of British financial relations with the Allies. Keynes was disgusted by the Treat of Versailles, and resigned over its adoption. He argued that the treaty would create massive economic instability, particularly in Germany, and the economic hardship that Europe would face would lead to political and international instability. This of course proved true a decade after the book's publication. Keynes calls the sequel to his masterpiece, a sort of "appendix". This book adds his new thoughts in light of events that occurred in the three years since the treaty was signed, and since Economic Consequences was first published. \$750














Bergson was an influential figure in early 20th-century philosophy and he and American philosopher William James were mutual admirers. James provided assistance to Mitchell in preparing this book for publication and intended to write a preface introducing the book to English readers; unfortunately, James' death in 1910 prevented him from fulfilling this intention. Creative Evolution is regarded as one of Bergson's three principal works (along with Time and Free Will and Matter and Memory), and was the first of his books to be translated into English. Bergson won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1927 "in recognition of his rich and vitalizing ideas and the brilliant skill with which they have been presented." An attractive copy. \$300

He spent time with the Ainu people of Japan, and traveled to other countries in Asia like Korea and India. Landor climbed Mount Lumpa in Nepal and joined the Boxer uprising in 1900 for a brief time. Between 1903 and 1911 he traveled in the Middle East and in central Africa, and explored the Mato Grosso of Brazil. The author was elected a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society in 1892, and a member of the Royal Institution in 1897. \$350
