


1. The Chicago Cinch Club; [Card Games]; [Gambling]; [Chicago]. The Laws and Etiquette of Cinch Compiled and Edited by The Chicago Cinch Club. Chicago: The Chicago Cinch Club, 1890. First edition. 12mo. [5], 6-35, [1] pp. Dull maroon cloth with gold lettering on the front board; textblock decoratively stained red. Title page printed in black and red ink. A Very Good or better copy with a name on the front flyleaf and two tiny spots on the foreedge, in which the decorative staining is rubbed away. Bicycle [Cards], "Cinch". Jessel and Horr 266. OCLC shows five holdings as of 9/2/20. Played with four players in partnerships, cinch was an extraordinarily popular game of the "All Fours" family, until it was displaced by Auction Bridge and Contract Bridge. This handbook lays out 40 rules for the game, followed by rules for a variation, called "Razzle-Dazzle Cinch", in which five or six players are competing. The little volume ends with a brief discussion of the etiquette of cinch, including rules for by-standing observers. A charming piece of local history, focused on midwestern entertainment and leisure during the turn of the century. **\$400** 



A very near Fine book with just a touch of toning to the edges of the boards in a bright and clean Near Fine dust jacket with a tiny tear to the bottom of the rear panel and a corresponding archival tape repair to the reverse. Anatomy of Wonder II-254. Currey 115. Based on Clarke's short story "The Sentinel", the novel was written by Clarke while he was writing the screenplay for the eponymous film with Stanley Kubrick. The novel was the Winner of the Hugo Award in 1969 for "Best Dramatic Presentation". Kubrick's film was the Winner of the 1969 Academy Award for Best Visual Effects. The influence of this novel on the science fiction genre cannot be overstated. Clarke's theme of man versus technology continues to powerfully resonate in the present day. 




The first edition of The Perfumed Garden was originally issued in parts, and is extraordinarily difficult to find. This is the second edition, issued by the Kama Shastra Society of London. Sir Richard Francis Burton would later attempt to produce an annotated, revised edition of his original translation of the Perfumed Garden, but the manuscript was burned by his wife, Isabel Burton, before it could reach the press. Lady Isabel likely objected to the topics explored by this erotic work: with chapters titled "Relating to the Act of Generation", "Concerning Everything Favourable to the Act of Coition", "The Sundry Names Given to the Sexual Parts of Men", "Sundry Names Given to the Sexual Organs of Women", "Concerning the Organs of Generation of Animals", "Concerning the Causes of Enjoyment in the Act of Generation", "Concerning Medicines which Provoke Abortion", and other explicit topics. The latter part of the book also delves into "increasing the dimensions of small members" and "things that take away the bad smell from the armpits and sexual parts of women". The work overall advises men and women on what causes an individual to be sexually appealing, how to achieve or avoid pregnancy, and how to increase sexual pleasure. An important translation of an historical work of erotica. \$750





This is the export edition, with the jacket that does not contain a price, the typos in the text as called for by Hammond and Anderson, and the blue and white headband on the top textblock. A beautiful copy of this important work by the most influential and beloved writer of fantasy. \$250








Green marbled endpapers and pastedowns. Illustrated with in-text and full-page wood-engravings and drawings by Rockwell Kent. This edition contains reproductions of the Kent illustrations from the three-volume edition published before this one. A Very Good example with mellowing to the spine and a small bump to the edge of the first few leaves (from the half-title to page 4), pages xxi-2 show a 1.25" closed tear to their margins. ADNB, Ann T. Keene, "Rockwell Kent". Ahearn Collected Books, 4th ed., 473. This is the first trade edition to be published after the three-volume Lakeside Press edition, which was the first edition with the Rockwell Kent illustrations. Kent's illustrations add a new dimension to Melville's classic tale of obsession and revenge. Kent himself traveled to Greenland, Alaska, and to other great wildernesses, which heavily inspired his artwork. A nice edition of an American classic, brought to life by Kent's haunting depictions of the whales, the sailors, and the sailing vessels of Melville's literary masterpiece. **\$600** 






A Very Good book with a contemporary annotation on the reverse of the title page, and with flaking and very minor loss to the leather on the crown and heel of the spine. Not in Moss or Dibdin. Oxford Classical Dictionary 804-805, 1147-1148. Juvenal, known for his anger and savage wit in his writings, is perhaps the most famous satirist of Ancient Rome. His satires would be used as a guide for Renaissance writers in the genre. Little is known about his life, but he is remembered for lambasting Rome, noblemen and women, and the institution of marriage in his writings. His satires are often printed with those of Persius, a Neronian satirist. His dialogues between the lazy student and the prudent mentor illustrate the virtues of stoicism and of learning philosophy. Persius is often regarded as "a paragon of Stoic virtue". A charming set of the satires from two eminent figures of Roman literature. \$400





This publication by Sendak experienced heavy censorship, book burning, and banning. Librarians and parents were upset by Mickey, the protagonist, being depicted in the nude. Librarians would draw diapers over the pictures, some schools banned the book, and some even went as far as burning the book. Even today it remains controversial, and is ranked 25th on the "100 Most Frequently Challenged Books of 1990-2000" list compiled by the American Library Association. It won the Caldecott Honor Award in 1971. \$275








Spilsbury, "St John, James Augustus [formerly James John; pseuds. Greville Brooke, Horace Gwynne]". James Augustus St. John was a prolific author, editor, and journalist, with sympathies for radical politics. He wrote numerous novels, biographies, and histories, including his own travel narratives of his trips to Egypt. This is his history of ancient Greece, drawn from original sources. St. John writes an exhaustive overview of Greek life in antiquity. He begins with a discussion of the original inhabitants of

Greece and the Greek character, before moving on to different aspects of life in Attica versus the Doric states (like Sparta). St. John details Spartan infanticide and athletics, as well as the philosophy of education in Attica compared to that of other city-states. Cultural events like Spartan festivals, marriage ceremonies, funerals, and the Greek dramatic theatre are discussed, along with an overview of Greek literature and music. St. John also delves into ancient Greek religion, and the role unmarried women played in temples. He also gives a history of what life was like for married women in Greece, with a discussion of clothes, makeup, and the workings of the private home. The class system of ancient Greece is discussed, from nobility, to the middle-class artisans, to slaves, to Spartan serfs and the poor. St. John concludes his history with a discussion of Greek food, and the Mediterranean economy: imports, exports, sailing, construction, trading across islands, and imports and exports from northern Africa and southern Italy. An excellent nineteenth-century history of ancient Greece, in an attractive binding. **\$850** 





Oxford DNB, Desmond Lee, "Guthrie, (William) Keith Chambers". William Keith Chambers Guthrie was a most distinguished classicist and historian. In 1956 the heads of Cambridge University Press asked Guthrie to write a comprehensive history of ancient Greek philosophy. Guthrie's series was intended to be five volumes, but he completed six volumes by 1981 (with the sixth covering Aristotle). The ODNB refers to his history as meticulous and captivating: "The History is in fact one of the great works of scholarship of the twentieth century". These volumes are difficult to find in the first edition, particularly Guthrie's first volume. A lovely set of a crucial history of ancient philosophy. \$300





Illustrated by a full-page map and a fold-out map in the rear. Includes a contemporary advertisement for Lieut. Eyre's Sketches in Afghanistan, Portraits of the Cabul Prisoners, noting "the plates will be published so as to bind up with Lady Sale's or Lieut. Eyre's Journals, and the Price will not exceed one guinea". A Near Fine book with a spot or two of foxing to the advertisement tipped in, and the two leaves following it. Oxford DNB, James Lunt, "Sale, Sir Robert Henry". Lady Florentia Sale was married to Robert Henry Sale in 1809. Robert Sale would become a general for the British Army, and Lady Sale would follow him across the world, to each new posting General Sale received. Lady Sale, her youngest daughter Alexandrina, Alexandrina's husband, and baby daughter spent nine months as hostages of Afghan leaders, leaders who were carrying out the uprising against the British occupation of Kabul. The hostages, including Lady Sale, were attacked by the Afghan leaders, with Lady Sale's son-inlaw losing his life. He was the only hostage to receive a proper burial (at the behest of Lady Sale herself). The surviving hostages were able to bribe their prison-guard, and fled to the mountains to meet General Sale's forces. Her journal records her time spent as a hostage, the harsh conditions of their captivity, and her critical observations of the British Army's actions in

the First Anglo-Afghan War. Her book was well-received in England, and she is praised for her courage: "Lady Sale became the heroine of the hour, renowned for her courage. She was a woman of character and unafraid of speaking her mind". Lady Sale died in 1853, in Cape Town, traveling from her home in India to the Cape of Good Hope. A beautifully bound copy of a woman's bold narrative of her own captivity, and how she saw the crisis as it unfolded around her. **\$800** 






With a typewritten letter from Mac Kinley Helm (an American author) to Zona Gale (the book is dedicated to Zona Gale), a photograph of Margery Latimer, and a newspaper clipping reporting Latimer's return for a summer stay with her parents in Portage. A Very Good book with a tiny separation between the backstrip and the textblock; dust jacket is Very Good with notable toning to the folds and spine panel, along with minor chipping. ADNB, Joy Castro, "Latimer, Margery Bodine, (06 February 1899-16 August 1932)". ADNB, James Fisher, "Gale, Zona, (26 August 1874-27 December 1938)". Margery Latimer was a feminist writer of the early 20th-century. Born in Portage, WI, at the age of 18 Latimer was mentored by her neighbor Zona Gale, a feminist playwright and novelist. Latimer spent her adult life in New York City, Portage, WI, and Chicago. According to the ADNB, Latimer's home in New York "was a meeting

place for young poets such as Kenneth Fearing, Carl Rakosi, and Horace Gregory, who memorialized it in his first book of poetry, *Chelsea Rooming House* (1930). Rakosi wrote of Latimer: "She wore no make-up, no high heels, no frills of any kind and only the most plain dresses. Her walk was unselfconscious, very straight and direct, without being masculine. What struck one immediately was her radiant presence. Blake would have described her as a cloud of gold" (Loughridge, p. 217)." (ADNB, Joy Castro, "Margery Latimer"). Latimer was also friends with Meridel Le Sueur, a labor activist and feminist writer, who would say that her writing was influenced by Latimer's. Latimer and Le Sueur incorporated female physicality and sensuality in their writings, a rebellion against their mentor's (Gale) disdain for the physical form.




Latimer regarded the female body as a site of spiritual experience and reclamation. Indeed, in her 1930 novel, *This is My Body*, Latimer includes a tragic and detailed description of the protagonist's abortion. Her novels and short stories address themes central to the modernist movement, like the disintegration of conservative social structures, small-town life in the Midwest, critiques of traditional family structures and gender roles, and "the immediacy of experience" through physical sensations. Latimer's life would be overshadowed by racist America: her marriage to Jean Toomer provoked supporters of anti-miscegenation laws, and Latimer and her husband were forced to flee to New Mexico and California while the press scandalized their marriage. Toomer himself had written an influential novel, *Cane*, which was associated with the Harlem Renaissance. Latimer died in childbirth in Chicago, at the age of 33, with the artistic community left to mourn the loss of a fierce and influential modernist, feminist voice. *We Are Incredible* is Latimer's first published novel, and was well-received by critics and her friends, including Zona Gale, who wrote a notice for the novel (which is printed on the jacket's front flap). An important association copy of a novel scarce in commerce. \$750



Oxford Classical Dictionary, 165-169. Aristotle's Nichomachean Ethics is the earliest extant, sustained examination of morality in Western philosophy. He explores what it means for a human being to flourish: how one can live "the good life". His work introduces the concept of eudaimonia (human well-being), the Doctrine of the Mean (acting between two extreme personality traits), and education by habituation. All of these concepts suggest that every person is capable of becoming virtuous and acting virtuously, if they strive towards a healthy life, and practice good works and choices. Aristotle himself wrote numerous works on biology, medicine, logic (his system of logic would dominate the field until the early twentieth century), physics, astronomy, politics, and philosophy. His influence on Western society is indelible, his "achievements have been fundamental to a great deal of the subsequent history of western philosophy ... few if any philosophers have so productively stimulated the inquiries of other distinguished philosophers; few philosophers of the remote past, if any, are so conspicuously alive in the range of questions they provoke and in the resourcefulness of the arguments they offer". 

Swarthmore College Peace Collection, "Henry Leroy Finch Jr. (Roy Finch) Papers, 1933-1995". Finch was a professor of philosophy at Sarah Lawrence College. He was a conscientious objector during WWII, and is the father of Annie Finch, the famous feminist poet and author. Oxford DNB, Maurice Headlam and Ivor Thomas, "Heath, Sir Thomas Little". Before Heath, little work had been done on Greek mathematics prior to Euclid. Heath was a pre-eminent classicist and helped to edit the ninth edition of Liddell and Scott's Greek -English Lexicon, adding several Greek mathematical terms to it. Heath was working on translating mathematical content in Aristotle's writings when he died. His wife, Sir David Ross, and Ivor Thomas helped to edit and complete the book for publication. A beautiful copy of the last work to be published by an eminent 20th-century classicist and scholar of ancient mathematics. **\$300** 





He gives an account of early Cheyenne history, including their patterns of settlement, their origins, and their interactions with white settlers. Grinnell describes Cheyenne clothing, daily life, diet, the Cheyenne calendar, leisure activities like smoking and story-telling, the family structure and marriage customs, as well as divorce, gender roles in Cheyenne culture, music, horses, warfare, Cheyenne religion, medical practices, and important members, or cultural heroes, of the Cheyenne tribe. An exhaustive account by Grinnell, vividly illustrated by candid photographs of the Cheyenne people. **\$500** 





Berkeley's Theory of Vision is Armstrong's first published book: a monograph examining the importance of Berkeley's essay on vision. Berkeley's essay was previously dismissed as psychology, or a preface work, but Armstrong's discussion of it illuminates its importance in modern philosophy and in philosophy of mind. \$200



The authors devote a section to the decline of the mechanical view, and proceed to explain their work on Relativity and Quanta. Einstein was famous for writing books intended to educate the public on his work and on the history of science. 


Dictionary 1483-1484. This is the final edition in the *Variorum* series, with the first edition compiled by Schrevelius and published in Lyon in 1644. It contains the entire Donatus commentary and extensive notes. Moss refers to this edition as the most "copious and correct one". Terence is reported to have been born in Carthage, and was a slave until he was freed shortly after he arrived to Rome. All six of his plays survive, with his prologues extant. Terence's plays are remembered for their well-constructed plots and sympathetic portrayal of human relationships. His prologues are unique in that he uses them to occasionally spar with his critics. Terence payed a great deal of homage to Greek tragedy, and to the plays of Menander (occasionally taking elements from these plays and inserting them into his own). His dialogue was very faithful to every-day Latin conversation, and his plays were widely read during the centuries after his death. \$475





They are biracial children, forced to navigate the racist and classist society put into place by Spanish colonization of Peru. Martín joins a monastery as a servant, but through his charitable acts and kindness he eventually achieves the status of member of the Third Order of St. Dominic (which colonial law technically forbade at the time). This book is a fictionalized version of the life of St. Martín de Porres. St.

Martín is the patron saint of mixed-race people, those who seek racial justice, barbers, public health workers, and innkeepers. A moving children's book that addresses a violent history of colonization, and shows that good people can prevail in the face of impossible circumstances. **\$50** 








Weyl is one of the giants of early twentieth century physics and mathematics and was one of the early members of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton. *The Classical Groups* led to renewed interest in invariant theory after many years of dormancy following results of Hilbert in the late nineteenth century. Howe describes the book as being widely viewed by mathematicians as "wonderful and terrible", the former in terms of the importance of the results presented, the latter in terms of presentation (but Howe himself disputes the latter). This is a very attractive copy of one of Weyl's most important books, exceedingly difficult to find in such fine condition. **\$500** 







