Paper pictorial jacket over softcover grey wraps. Includes a bookmark for Kodansha English library. Translated by Alfred Birnbaum. Lacks the "obi" band. Very near Fine in very near Fine dust jacket. Wikipedia, "Hear the Wind Sing". The first novel in Murakami's Trilogy of the Rat, made available in English only by Kodansha International Publishing (until 2015 when the story was published in an omnibus English edition of Murakami's works). Murakami preferred this, as he considered it to be a work from his "immature" period. The novel is concerned with the Japanese student movement, writing as a process, and the ways in which Japanese and Western culture interacted in the latter half of the 20th century. \$450








Plato's literary masterpiece, inspiring and informing countless discussions on political science and political philosophy, and courses on ancient thought and culture. 



[6], vii-xxviii, [2], 31-334, [2]; [4], v-xxxv, [3], 39-408 pp. Red cloth lettered in gold on the front boards and spine, each front board with a decoration in gilt. No dust jackets. Decorative endpapers and pastedowns. Each volume illustrated by a frontispiece, volume one with 58 additional black and white plates (the first several with photographs on both sides), a sketch of the tomb and a facsimile of a letter written by Lord Carnarvon also in volume one. Volume two illustrated with 72 additional black and white photograph plates. Illustrations depict many of King Tut's artifacts and possessions, the opening of his tomb, several household items from the Pharaohs, coffins, sarcophagi, religious relics, state chariots, royal jewelry and headpieces, royal dishes, walking sticks, a throne, and several statues of King Tut. Very Good with minor wear to the extremities and a 1924 name and date on the front pastedown of volume one, volume two shows scattered foxing but the plates are clean. Carter published three volumes on his excavations of King Tut's tomb: in 1923, 1927, and 1933 respectively. These are the first two volumes.





Oxford DNB, T.G.H. James, "Carter, Howard (1874–1939)". Howard Carter was a watercolour artist, an Egyptologist, and an archaeologist. In 1899 at the age of 26, he was appointed the first chief inspector of antiquities in Upper Egypt by Gaston Maspero, director-general of the antiquities service of Egypt. He fought tomb-robbers, and worked to restore and protect monuments at Thebes and elsewhere. Carter directed excavations for the antiquities service at the tomb of King Mentuhotpe II, and discovered the tomb of King Tuthmosis IV. In 1909 he began to work with George Herbert, the fifth Earl of Carnarvon. They excavated in Thebes until 1914, and then focused on the Valley of the Kings in 1922, when Carter unearthed the stairway to the tomb of Tutankhamun in November of 1922. Due to bureaucratic hang-ups, the entire archaeological project was not completed until ten years later. However, this publication offers a great deal of information on Carter and his team's findings. A record of a thrilling discovery, important to classicists, historians, and to anyone passionate about ancient civilizations. **\$500**





A Near Fine book with the green topstain faded away, dust jacket is very near Fine with just a bit of edge wear. The true first edition was published in 1822, with subsequent editions in 1823 and 1856. Hailed as a monumental and early drug memoir, De Quincey details his addiction to laudanum (opium mixed with alcohol) and the visions he saw while taking the drug. A beautiful copy of the Bodley Head edition, with captivating drawings by Ms. Woolf. **\$300**








Oxford DNB, "Robert Andrews". The first work printed by Baskerville was the works of Virgil published in Latin (in 1757). This is the first and only Baskerville edition of Robert Andrews' Virgil. The most significant translation put forth by the eighteenth century Presbyterian minister, beautifully published by a master of the printing press. **\$850**







William Wordsworth, together, with his friend and fellow poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge, launched the Romantic age of literature and art. Known for his love of solitude, and adoration of the natural world, Wordsworth is a towering figure in the English literary canon. 

Volumes also illustrated with 67 intext diagrams, from the original editions. Assembled and edited by Alexandre Koyré and I. Bernard Cohen with the assistance of Anne Whitman. Very near Fine in very near Fine dust jacket. Pressler, Printing in the Mind of Man (PMM) 96. According to PMM, "The *Principia* is generally described as the greatest work in the history of science ... [providing] the great synthesis of the cosmos, proving finally its physical unity". Newton's work provided the last blow to the Aristotelian view of the universe, present and dominant through the medieval period and into the Renaissance. The book was a great


catalyst for the Scientific Revolution. This edition allows the reader to see how Newton's work evolved over time, from the manuscript draft of the first edition between 1685 and 1687 to the release of the third edition in 1726. The textual variations are displayed, with other variant readings taken from surviving manuscripts. The front flap refers to this publication as a photographic reprint of the third edition, with the variant readings from the seven other sources at the bottom of each page. Thus the reader can easily observe Newton's changes. The appendices provide a bibliography of the Principia, information on the contributions of Roger Cotes and Henry Pemberton, and a complete table of contents for the third edition. A beautiful example of this important and comprehensive edition of one of the great works of science. \$500







The first edition of Wright & Potter's publication of *Bradford's History of Plimoth*. Oxford DNB, Michael McGiffert, "Bradford, William (1590–09 May 1657)". William Bradford's historical masterpiece records the early events of Plymouth Plantation, the Mayflower, and the Pilgrims' settlement in Massachusetts. Bradford was thought of as a fair and practical governor of Plymouth Colony, and used his own memory and those of the other pilgrims to record an accurate history of life in Plymouth. The ODNB refers to Bradford's journal as "[n]ot only an invaluable record of early English settlement on the North American continent, it is commonly acknowledged the foremost work of history produced in the English colonies in the seventeenth century." **\$250**

Here Wideman writes about a young black man recovering from a drug addiction, and an older college professor who is a closeted gay man. The two meet and interact in unexpected ways. A fascinating mid-20th century novel, written by a black author, who tells the stories of two characters with tenderness and grit. \$150



Pierre-Antoine Tabeau wrote his journal as a report for the authorities of Spanish Louisiana, from 1803 to 1805, while he lived on a cedar island in the Missouri River 1200 miles north of what is now St. Louis. Tabeau records his business dealings (related to the fur trade) with Native Americans who lived on the Upper Missouri, and his life on the frontier. A beautiful copy. \$150










Each drawing has a lady dressing for winter, spring, summer, and fall (in the latest fashion of the day). The winter sheet was a supplement to the Boston Herald, issued on Dec. 8th, 1895, the spring sheet was the supplement to the Boston Herald issued on Dec. 15, 1895, the summer sheet a supplement to the Herald issued on Dec. 22, 1895, and the fall sheet was a supplement to the Boston Herald issued on Dec. 29, 1895. All sheets are tied together by a thin pink ribbon. Very Good+ with the occasional, tiny surface rub, and a discreet tear to the right margin of both the spring and summer sheets (.5" and 1" respectively). Each sheet has a small calendar in the left corner with three months represented on each sheet. The winter sheet depicts a lady standing in a public square, with a church and municipal building in the background, spring shows a lady picking flowers in a pastoral lane, summer shows a lady sitting on a bench next to a hayfield, and the fall sheet depicts a lady mailing letters on a city street, with yellow flowers in her hand. Veenfliet was a German-born American artist, Civil War Veteran (having fought for the Union), an architect, and an early advocate for immigration. Veenfliet moved from New York state to Michigan and would become a member of the Cincinnati Art Club. He was active in the art community until his death in 1922. 

Binding is Near Fine with two tiny splits to the paper over the joints, leaves rarely show foxing with one or two corners missing, not affecting the text, marginal annotations, or the catch words. Overall a nice, clean copy. *A Manual of Classical Bibliography*, Joseph Moss, 700. *The Oxford Classical Dictionary* 1134; 1516-1521. **The first edition in Italian.** Moss records this imprint as the first edition in Italian and writes that it has been reprinted several times, both with and without dates. Adams records an undated Venetian imprint from Baldassar de Constantini (Adams T-684), but not the Venetian Valgrisi imprint (the Constantini imprint recorded by Adams shares the same collation as the Valgrisi imprint).







Thucydides' *Peloponnesian War* is one of the first written histories, dependent on eyewitness accounts and primary sources, to be produced in the Western world. The work is divided into several parts: an introductory book, a section on The Ten Years War (focused on the conflict between Athens and Corinth), the peace that followed this war (The Peace of Nicias), the Sicilian War, the Plague that struck Athens, with the last book (Book 8) a portion of Thucydides history on the Decelean War. Thucydides intended his histories to describe the events that directly follow the ones recorded by Herodotus. He began writing the books soon after the Peloponnesian War started, and recorded several of the events soon after they happened. From his 20s to his 50s, Thucydides worked on his histories, and the work reflects his changing perspective over time. His scientific, exacting approach to describing the causes of the war and the fall of Athens, along with his brief and concise prose all help his work to stand apart from the other historical writings of Classical Antiquity. **\$2,000**







Andrew Gasson, "Man and Wife" (accessed 7/27/2020). Parrish 80. The first American trade edition. Collins' novel attacks Irish and Scottish marriage laws, and their lack of protection for a married woman's earnings and property rights. The book also contains an early example of a "locked room murder plot". In its day, critics praised the novel for its critique of competitive athletics (as demonstrated by the character Geoffrey), but critics were not pleased with Collins' progressive attitude towards marriage reform and a married woman's autonomy. \$375





Peano is one of the key figures in modern mathematical logic, best known for the Peano postulates, the (still) standard set of axioms he proposed as the basis for arithmetic capturing in a formal way the mathematical definition of the natural numbers. Russell famously cited the influence of Peano based on a conference he attended with Peano in 1900 during which the precision and formal approach of Peano and his students impressed Russell greatly. This experience was an important influence on his work on both *Principle of Mathematics* and (with Whitehead) on *Principia Mathematica*. Peano made a number of important contributions to the foundations of mathematics which are well-represented in this collection. After meeting James Brooke in 1842, in Singapore, the two campaigned against piracy in the region. From 1844 to 1847 Keppel was retired until he returned to Borneo in the Maeander to assist Brooke at combatting piracy.




Keppel served in the Crimean War, and fought in the Second Opium War in 1857. His *Visit to the Indian Archipelago* records his voyages with Brooke from Rio De Janeiro to Singapore and Borneo. Along the way, Keppel encounters wild hogs, tigers, water buffalo, and pirates on the rivers and seas. A great deal of his writing is devoted to his time spent in Malaysia, specifically in the regions of Labuan and Sarawak. Keppel also reports on the diseases his crew and James Brooke suffer, referring to "Labuan Fever". Descriptions of the Dyak people are given by Keppel, and his encounters with Sepoys are recorded. The end of volume one contains a history of piracy around the world, from ancient to what were then "modern times". Volume two details Keppel's observations on Governor James Brooke's rule of the Sarawak province, including its churches, courts, hospitals, and schools. Birds, bees, the proboscis monkey, kangaroos, birds of paradise, and alligators are discussed in Kepple's second volume. Volume two also records his travels to Java and Timor, and has descriptions of the practice of cannibalism. On his journey Keppel observed volcanoes, traveled to New Guinea and to the spice islands, and records his trading with the natives of the region. An attractive set on varied and diverse topics, a classic of nineteenth-century travel and exploration. \$2,500


